Sisters of Grace, many recent changes have occurred in Arkansas that personally touched our lives. On March 31, a fierce tornado blasted through Central Arkansas, neighboring towns and the city of Wynne. Many of our families, friends and neighbors were impacted by this catastrophic event. On Saturday, May 13 at a special session in Hot Springs, the Arkansas Annual Conference approved 67 United Methodist Churches to ratify their disaffiliation request to leave the denomination. Unfortunately, both of these events have severely impacted the United Women in Faith. These are just some of the challenges that we must face. This is an opportunity for us to reach out to other women in need and to take care of our Sisters of Grace. We must continue to keep our families, friends and neighbors in prayer for healing.

As members of United Women in Faith, we know that we can remain a member even if our church disaffiliates. Members and units that choose to stay connected beyond their church disaffiliating or their unit going inactive have an option to become an All Access Member and/or start an ALL ACCESS group to remain connected to the mission and work of United Women in Faith. It is vital for members to understand what's changing in our organization and why. Change can be positive but change can also be difficult. The United Women in Faith has always changed as times change.

Our message from Harriett Jane Olson in the May/June response Magazine talks about Mission Giving and how we need to collectively recommit to Mission Giving. She talks about careful spending being a must and reducing expenditures is not the way to grow our mission impact because our call to mission is strong and the needs of women, children, and youth are many. As we share in sisterhood, we must continue to stand together to put our faith into action, be a source of strength and pray for peace, mercy and grace. We have to remain passionate about our mission, continue to inspire women and influence others to join us and to impact the world by making a lasting difference. Acts of love. Acts of faith. 

Hendrix College • July 26-29, 2023

Who: Mission u is open to members and non-members of United Women in Faith. Arkansas Conference Mission u offers classes, workshops, mission work, and plenary sessions, as well as studies for children and youth. A nursery is also available for infants and toddlers.

Where: Mission u is held on the Hendrix College campus in Conway.

When: Wednesday, July 26 - Saturday, July 29

Theme: Living the Kin-dom

This will be a two-year study, with a distinct curriculum created for both 2023 and 2024. In 2023 of Living the Kin-dom, we will explore the heart of the good news of the kingdom. Why do preaching the good news of the Kin-dom and acts of curing and healing seem to go hand in hand (Luke 9: 2, 11)? If the kingdom of God is like a man who scatters seed (Mark 4:26-29), like yeast (Matt 13:33; Luke 13:20-21), or like hidden treasure (Matt 13:44) what kind of kingdom was Jesus ushering in? How did this kingdom compare to Rome, the ruling empire of his day? And why do we prefer kin-dom over kingdom?

What: Arkansas Conference Mission u is an opportunity to study current issues impacting society based on recent mission study topics. At Mission u, participants grow in understanding of the mission of the church in the current world context. The studies give particular attention to the responsibilities of women in the fulfillment of the mission work of the church.

Spiritual Growth Coordinator Brenda Gullett



While the phrase "spiritual direction" may sound a bit lofty, it is simply a relationship through which one person assists another in attending to the presence and call of God in all of life. Though not always called by this name, spiritual direction has been a vital ministry in many streams of the Church for hundreds of years.

Spiritual direction is for anyone yearning for God. Sometimes this desire appears as a sense of longing for something greater or a sense of discontent with the status quo. For others this pining is more focused, rising from a clear understanding that a sense of God's presence is missing from particular parts of life.

The role of spiritual director involves asking evocative questions that invite others to attend to the presence and the voice of God. The experience of spiritual direction involves taking time to care for your soul and examine your spiritual journey with someone who provides heartfelt listening and reflection along the way. This sounds very appealing and exiting to me. How about you? Well, guess what this practice is alive and well in the Arkansas Conference and those of you attending Mission U will experience a meaningful introduction to this concept.

Introduction to Spiritual Direction will be done in a workshop format on Thursday afternoon of Mission U. We will be privileged to have the following women as our leaders. All three have been trained at Perkins Seminary and work with the Arkansas Conference.

<u>Tee Bolin</u>: "My invitation as a spiritual director is simply, as a guide, to explore and offer a deeper connection to your uniquely created and divine path. A protected canyon that allows you to speak out loud your very soul and hear back the echo of God."

Mary Jane Cole: "As a Spiritual Director, I serve as a companion walking alongside a person on their path of discovery and growth. Through deep listening, reflective questions, and holding sacred and safe space, we give attention to noticing the work and presence of the Holy in a person's life. "We are not human beings having a spiritual experience. We are spiritual beings having a human experience."

<u>Tracy DePue</u>: "As a director, my intent is to offer a welcoming, safe and non-judgmental space of compassion and curiosity where you can connect with God and yourself in the exploration of your journey together."

Along these same lines, are you aware of The Calling Kit offered for churches by the Arkansas Conference. The <u>Calling Kit</u>: Every person has a calling. It is the mission of the ARUMC Culture of Calling initiative to help guide every local church to create an environment in which every person is invited to discover their calling and to find out how they might live into that calling. By using The Calling Kit in your local church, you will create a safe space for exploration and discernment.

Charter for Racial Justice in an Interdependent Global Community

Because we believe:

- 1. That God is the Creator of all people, and all are God's children in one family;
- 2. That racism is a rejection of the teachings of Jesus Christ;
- 3. That racism denies the redemption and reconciliation of Jesus Christ;
- 4. That racism robs all human beings of their wholeness and is used as a justification for social, economic, environmental and political exploitation;
- 5. That we must declare before God and before one another that we have sinned against our sister and brothers of other races in thought, in word and in deed;
- 6. That in our common humanity in creation, all women and men are made in God's image, and all persons are equally valuable in the sight of God;
- 7. That our strength lies in our racial and cultural diversity and that we must work toward a world in which each person's value is respected and nurtured;
- 8. That our struggle for justice must be based on new attitudes, new understandings and new relationships, and must be reflected in the laws, policies, structures and practices of both church and state;

We commit ourselves as individuals and as a community to follow Jesus Christ in word and in deed, and to struggle for the rights and the self-determination of every person and group of persons.

Therefore, as United Methodists in every place across the land, we will unite our efforts within the church to take the following actions:

- 1. Eliminate all forms of institutional racism in the total ministry of the church, giving special attention to those institutions that we support, beginning with their employment policies, purchasing practices, environmental policies and availability of services and facilities.
- 2. Create opportunities in local churches to deal honestly with the existing racist attitudes and social distance between members, deepening the Christian commitment to be the church where all racial groups and economic classes come together.
- 3. Increase efforts to recruit people of all races into the membership of The United Methodist Church and provide leadership development opportunities without discrimination.
- 4. Establish workshops and seminars in local churches to study, understand and appreciate the historical and cultural contributions of each race to the church and community.
- 5. Raise local churches' awareness of the continuing needs for equal education, housing, employment, medical care and environmental justice for all members of the community, and to create opportunities to work for these things across racial lines.
- 6. Work for the development and implementation of national and international policies to protect the civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights of all people such as through support of the ratification of United Nations covenants on human rights.
- 7. Support and participate in the worldwide struggle for liberation in church and community.
- 8. Facilitate nomination and election processes that include all racial groups by employing a system that prioritizes leadership opportunities of people from communities that are disproportionately impacted by the ongoing legacy of racial injustice, and use measures to align our vision for racial justice with actions that accelerate racial equality.



Northeast District Happenings



We took a different approach to Officers Training as a way to better serve our needs in responding to the many changes and new opportunities facing us. Going to four different locations in the district, we held 2 hour Unit Leadership trainings. Not only did it reduce travel time for many, but allowed for Units to come together and begin to share ideas and ways we could move forward. Special thanks to our host Units: Norfork, Holiday Hills, Corning and Mountain View.

Mentioned earlier, activities have picked up, some new, some reinstated. United Women In Faith Sundays are being held with focus on sharing new programs and the role of the women leaders within each community. To name just a few other events: the Melbourne Unit held a Soup and Sandwich Luncheon to raise monies to purchase suitcases for foster children. So often they may only have a plastic bag to carry their belongings. The Holiday Hills Ladies May Salad Luncheon to honor and better connect all women in the surrounding communities was bigger and better than ever. Offered twice a year, there had to be over 80 salads to enjoy as well as 130 plus women to try every one. The Cherokee Village women assisted in transforming their church into a warming shelter complete with beds, meals, activities, and transportation during the unusual cold front that hit their area. CVUMC even included care for pets. The ladies at Wynne and surrounding areas responded immediately to the tornadoes that ravaged their community. And Units throughout the state continue to respond to the need regardless of the location. Arkansas is truly a caring and giving state.

Our Spring Day Apart was held May 6 at Mount Eagle Methodist Retreat Center. It was the perfect spot to focus on our two social justice issues: Climate and Racial justice. What better spot to be reminded that God has given us the stewardship of His creation. Terrariums were made as an example of the role we each play in caring for our little ecosystem. We took a much different approach to racial justice by focusing on our inclusion journey and its impact in creating a culture of acceptance. 


